Monday (Early Morning)

THE GOD WHO IS REAL

Seeing who God is and how He meets us

Hebrews says that anyone who comes to God must believe He exists and that He rewards those who earnestly seek Him. Every human heart feels this hunger for God—we were created to know Him. The Holy Spirit also gives us an inner assurance. When we follow Jesus, the Spirit speaks inside our hearts and helps us cry out, “*Abba, Father!*” God becomes real to us—not far away, but close and loving.

The Identity of God

The Bible tells us that God is the living God, the personal God, and the God who is Spirit. These three truths show us what God is really like.

- 1. God is Living.** God is living. He speaks, acts, saves, guides, and gives life. He is active right now—not just in ancient stories. The Holy Spirit is the clearest sign of God’s living presence. The Spirit brings new life, power, change, and holiness.
- 2. God is Personal.** God talks, calls, guides, and relates to people. He is King, Shepherd, Judge, Husband—and above all, Father. God’s personal heart is fully shown in Jesus Christ. Jesus is God in human form, meeting people face to face. He teaches us to pray “Father”, showing that God wants a close relationship with us. This is rooted in the Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
- 3. God is Spirit.** When Jesus says, “*God is Spirit*”, He means:

- a. God is not physical:** Phrases like God’s “*hand*”, “*face*”, or “*arm*” are pictures that help us understand His nearness, not literal descriptions.

- b. **God is active:** His Spirit creates, speaks, saves, and renews.
- c. **God is utterly free:** Nothing limits Him. He is free to love, help, forgive, and show mercy. His freedom is always guided by His holy love.
- d. **Worship and life happen through the Spirit:** Because God is Spirit, we worship Him *“in Spirit and truth”*. The Holy Spirit gives us strength, freedom, passion, and power to live out God’s mission.

Prayer Points

- **“God, make Your presence real to me.”** Pray for a living awareness of God—ask the Holy Spirit to help you feel His nearness, hear His voice, and know Him as *“Abba, Father”*.
- **“Help me know You personally, not just know about You.”** Ask God to deepen your relationship with Him—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Pray to experience His love, guidance, and friendship in your everyday life.
- **“Holy Spirit, fill me and lead me today.”** Pray for the Spirit’s help to live out your faith with strength, freedom, courage, and joy. Ask for His power to obey God, overcome challenges, and serve others.

Monday (Late Night)

THE TRANSCENDENCE OF GOD

God is far above us—yet still near

God is transcendent. This means God is totally above, beyond, and different from everything He created. There are qualities only He has—His greatness, His infinity, His total freedom. These are sometimes called His “incommunicable attributes”, meaning they belong to Him alone.

But God’s transcendence doesn’t mean He is far away, cold, or unreachable. In fact, it is the very opposite. Because God is infinitely greater than us, He is able to love us, reach us, and help us in ways no one else can. His “beyondness” is what makes grace possible. We do not reach God by climbing high enough, praying hard enough, or becoming perfect enough. We are limited; He is not. The Holy Spirit bridges that infinite distance. God comes down to us and meets us first.

(A) GOD IS INFINITE

God has no limits. Nothing can contain Him, measure Him, or hold Him. Everything in creation has boundaries—space, time, energy, lifespan, ability. God has none.

The Bible uses powerful images to help us imagine this:

- God is “*high and exalted*” (Isa. 6:1).
- Even the highest heavens cannot contain Him (1 Kings 8:27).
- Job says He is higher than the heavens, deeper than the grave, and wider than the sea (Job 11:7–9).

When we realise that God is infinitely exalted, our natural response is worship. We lift His name high. As the Psalms say, “*Be exalted, O*

God, above the heavens!” (Ps. 57:5). The Spirit draws us into deep, joyful, heart-awakening praise that connects us with God’s greatness and love.

But God’s infinity also shows us our proper posture: humility. If God alone is truly great, then we don’t boast in ourselves—we boast in the Lord (Ps. 34:2). Pride cannot survive in the presence of an infinite God. But humility opens us to His presence. Jesus said, “*those who humble themselves will be exalted*” (Matt. 23:12).

This is one of the great secrets of spiritual life:
The lower we bow, the more God fills us.
The more we surrender, the more we receive.
The smaller we become, the greater His presence becomes in us.

Prayer Points

- **“God, help me see how great You really are.”** Pray for fresh awe of God’s greatness—His power, His holiness, His infinity.
- **“Holy Spirit, thank You for coming near. Fill me again.”** Ask the Holy Spirit to make God real to you, to draw you into worship, and to help you feel His love and nearness.
- **“Lord, teach me humility so You can fill my life.”** Pray for a surrendered heart—one that bows low before God and receives His strength, peace, and purpose.

Tuesday (Early Morning)

(B) GOD IS ETERNAL

God has no beginning, no end, and is not limited by time

God has always existed, He will always exist, and He is never trapped inside time the way we are. Nothing about God is shaped by time. Time affects us, but time never affects Him.

When God spoke to Moses, He called Himself “*I AM*” (Exod. 3:14). He was revealing something huge: God doesn’t just live in moments—He is the source of every moment that has ever existed. He does not move from the past to the present to the future. Instead, His life is an eternal now. The Bible expresses this beautifully: “*From everlasting to everlasting You are God*” (Ps. 90:2). Not “You were” or “You will be”, but “You are”—always.

Sometimes when people hear “eternal”, they imagine something still, frozen, or lifeless. But God’s eternity is the exact opposite. God’s eternal life is really eternal love. Inside God’s eternal being, there is:

- The eternal love between Father, Son, and Spirit
- The eternal begetting of the Son
- The eternal movement of the Spirit
- The never-ending overflow of divine love

This overflowing love is the reason Pentecost happens. The Holy Spirit is poured out into time from the eternal life of God. God’s eternity doesn’t keep Him far away—it’s what allows Him to give Himself so freely and fully to us.

Even though God is beyond time, He cares about what happens in time. He created time. He sustains it. He works through it. Because God is eternal, He never gets tired, never forgets, never runs out of

patience, and never leaves us. Moses says it perfectly: “*The eternal God is your refuge, and underneath are the everlasting arms*” (Deut. 33:27). His arms never weaken. His love never fades. His care never ends.

Eternal Life Begins Now

The greatest promise is this: God shares His eternity with us. Through Jesus and the Holy Spirit, eternal life has already begun in our hearts. We are not waiting for eternity to start after death—its seed is alive in us right now. One day, when time has completed its purpose, God will bring us into the full experience of His eternal love—a life with no ending, no decay, no fear, and no loss.

Prayer Points

- **“God, help me remember that You are eternal and always with me.”** Pray for trust in God’s constant presence, even when life feels uncertain or stressful.
- **“Jesus, thank You for stepping into time for me.”** Pray with gratitude that the eternal God came close and understands your life completely.
- **“Holy Spirit, fill me with eternal life today.”** Ask the Spirit to grow His life, peace, and purpose in your heart right now.

Tuesday (Late Night)

(C) GOD IS UNCHANGING

God's steady heart is the safest place in a changing world

One of the most comforting truths in the Christian faith is this: God does not change. His character, His being, His love, and His purposes stay absolutely constant. Everything around us shifts—people grow, friendships evolve, feelings come and go, and the world moves so quickly it's hard to keep up. But in the middle of all this uncertainty, God says: "*I the LORD do not change*" (Mal. 3:6).

The Bible often describes God as the Rock. A rock doesn't get shaken by storms. It doesn't shift with the wind. It stays firm no matter what pushes against it. That is what God is like: steady, reliable, and trustworthy.

James writes, "*Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father ... who does not change like shifting shadows*" (James 1:17). And the New Testament says the same about Jesus: "*Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever*" (Heb. 13:8). Father, Son, and Holy Spirit share this unchanging nature. God's faithfulness is not seasonal—it is eternal.

Some people think if God never changes, He must be distant or emotionally cold—like an unmoved statue or a cosmic force that doesn't care. But the Bible shows a very different picture. The unchanging God feels compassion for the hurting, weeps over suffering, shows joy in repentance, walks closely with His people, and enters human suffering through Jesus.

God's unchanging nature does not make Him frozen—it makes Him trustworthy. Because He never changes, His emotions are perfect, not chaotic or unstable. His love isn't a burst of passion—it's a

steady flame. His mercy doesn't come and go—it flows constantly. His justice isn't random—it's rooted in who He is.

In Pentecostal theology, God's unchanging nature is understood as the eternal fullness of divine love. The Father, Son, and Spirit have always shared perfect love—and because it never changes, it can always be poured into our lives. The Holy Spirit's movement is not a sign that God changes; it is a sign that His unchanging love keeps overflowing.

Because God does not change, you can always run to Him. His love will never fail you. His promises will always stand. As the old hymn says, "*O Thou who changest not, abide with me.*" When everything else shifts, God stays the same—and that is our hope.

Prayer Points

- **"God, thank You that You never change. Help me trust Your steady love."** Ask God to help you rest in His consistency when life feels uncertain.
- **"Jesus, be my Rock when everything around me feels shaky."** Pray for His peace and stability in school, friendships, and personal struggles.
- **"Holy Spirit, teach me to rely on God more each day."** Ask Him to build deeper confidence in God's promises and character.

Wednesday (Early Morning)

THE CHARACTER OF GOD

What God's heart is really like

(A) GOD IS LOVE

The Bible makes a stunning claim: “*God is love*” (1 John 4:8). It does not say God simply *has* love or shows love. It says He is love. Love is the deepest truth about God. Before creation existed, love was already alive within the Trinity—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit sharing perfect life together. Because love is God’s nature, everything He does—from forming the universe to saving us through Jesus—is an expression of His holy, self-giving love.

God’s Love in the Old Testament

God’s love shines through the entire story of Israel. God chose Israel not because they were strong or impressive, but simply because the LORD loved them (Deut. 7:6–8). Through Isaiah, God says, “*You are precious... I love you*” (Isa. 43:4). In Hosea, God likens Himself to a parent teaching a toddler to walk—holding Israel close, and even when they rebel, crying out: “*How can I give you up?*” (Hosea 11:1–8). The Old Testament shows a God whose heart is full of compassion, tenderness, and deep, committed love.

God’s Love in Jesus Christ

In the New Testament, God’s love becomes even clearer through Jesus. He loved His disciples “*to the end*” (John 13:1). He laid down His life for them (John 15:13). But Jesus’ love goes beyond loving friends. He died for the ungodly, for sinners, for people who did not want Him (Rom. 5:6–8). This is love at its highest point. At the cross, Jesus took on the weight of the world’s sin. God’s love is

cruciform—a love that bleeds, suffers, endures, and gives without limit. This is the meaning of *“This is love ... that He loved us and sent His Son”* (1 John 4:10).

The Nature of God’s Love (*Agape*)

1. **Self-giving:** *Agape* love gives, even when the other person doesn’t deserve it. It is not based on attraction, feelings, or what we get in return.
2. **Free and spontaneous:** God loves because love is who He is—not because He “needs” us.
3. **Too big to fully understand:** God’s love is wider, higher, deeper, and longer than we can ever measure (Eph. 3:17–19).
4. **For all people:** God’s love expands to the whole world: “*God so loved the world...*” (John 3:16).

Prayer Points

- **“God, let me experience Your love in a real and personal way.”** Ask the Holy Spirit to help you feel God’s love, not just know it in your mind.
- **“Jesus, thank You for loving me on the cross. Help me trust Your love daily.”** Pray for deeper confidence that Jesus’ sacrifice shows how valuable you are to Him.
- **“Holy Spirit, fill my heart with God’s love so I can love others like You do.”** Ask God to make you a person of compassion, forgiveness, and kindness.

Wednesday (Late Night)

(B) GOD IS HOLY

The blazing purity and beauty at the centre of who God is

Holiness is the foundation of God's character. When the Bible describes God, the word used more than any other is "holy". Isaiah calls Him "*the Holy One*" (Isa. 43:3), and the angels around His throne cry out forever, "*Holy, holy, holy is the LORD!*" (Isa. 6:3). God's holiness is not just one moral quality among others. It is the core of who He is—the bright, burning purity of His love, His goodness, and His perfection. When God appeared to Moses through the burning bush, the very first truth He revealed was His holiness: "*Take off your sandals... the ground is holy*" (Exod. 3:5).

1. God is Absolutely Pure

The Bible says God is "*of purer eyes than to look on evil*" (Hab. 1:13). This purity was symbolised in Israel's worship:

- pure gold
- cleansing rituals
- sacrifices without blemish

All these point to Jesus, the perfect "*Passover lamb*" (1 Cor. 5:7), whose sacrifice makes us clean. But holiness is not only about outward actions. Jesus strongly warns against looking pure on the outside while being corrupted inside (Matt. 23:25–26). True holiness begins deep within the heart. Jesus says, "*Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God*" (Matt. 5:8).

2. God is Absolutely Righteous

God's righteousness means He is perfectly upright, fair, and morally true. The Bible says, "*Good and upright is the LORD*" (Ps. 25:8). The

greatest revelation of God's righteousness is the cross. At the cross, God's holy love and God's righteous judgment meet in one moment. Jesus takes the weight of human sin so we can receive God's righteousness.

3. God is Absolutely Just

Justice flows out of God's righteousness. The Bible says:

"Righteousness and justice are the foundation of Your throne" (Ps. 89:14). God is completely fair and shows no partiality (Rom. 2:11). His justice is rooted in love. Through Amos, God calls His people to reflect His justice: *"Let justice roll on like a river"* (Amos 5:24).

Spirit-filled people should care for the needy, defend the vulnerable, and work for justice. God's holiness, righteousness, and justice flow together as expressions of His holy love in the world.

Prayer Points

- **"Holy God, make my heart pure so I can reflect Your love."** Ask the Holy Spirit to cleanse your heart and help you live with integrity.
- **"Jesus, help me live out true righteousness—not just rules, but a transformed heart."** Pray for strength to choose what is right, even when it costs something.
- **"Spirit of God, fill me with compassion and courage to stand for justice."** Ask God to help you care for the broken, defend the weak, and love others boldly.

Thursday (Early Morning)

(C) GOD IS THE GOD OF TRUTH

God is the most trustworthy reality in the universe

The Bible teaches that God is the living and true God (1 Thess. 1:9), that the God revealed to Israel—YHWH—and revealed fully through Jesus Christ is the only true God (Jer. 10:10; John 17:3). Jesus shows us what God is really like. He is “*full of grace and truth*” (John 1:14) and boldly declares: “*I am the way, the truth, and the life*” (John 14:6). Jesus doesn’t just *point* to truth—He *is* the truth. Everything God wants us to know about Himself is revealed in Jesus’ life, teachings, death, and resurrection.

The God of Total Integrity

The Bible says that “*God is not human, that He should lie*” (Num. 23:19), and “*Let God be true, though every human being a liar*” (Rom. 3:4). God never manipulates. He never misleads. His written Word is true—“*The word of the LORD is true.*” Because of this, God calls His people to reflect His truthfulness. The church is called “*the pillar and foundation of the truth*” (1 Tim. 3:15). A Spirit-filled community should be known for honesty, transparency, and integrity.

The God of Dependability and Faithfulness

Because God is true, He is also totally dependable. Creation itself reflects His reliability—the sun rises every day, seasons come and go, gravity doesn’t suddenly disappear. All this points to a God who is steady and faithful. God’s promises may take time, and they may unfold in surprising ways, but they never fail. God’s truthfulness is always connected to His faithfulness. When He commits Himself to His people, He stays with them, even when they fall short.

Lamentations proclaims: “*The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases... great is Your faithfulness*” (Lam. 3:22–23, NRSV). God’s faithfulness is anchored in Christ: “*He will keep you firm to the end... God is faithful*” (1 Cor. 1:8–9), and even when we fail, “*He remains faithful, for He cannot deny Himself*” (2 Tim. 2:13).

Walking in the Truth: Father, Son, and Spirit

Because God is the God of truth, He calls us to walk in His light (Isa. 2:5). The whole Trinity is involved: the Father is the God of truth, the Son *is* the truth (John 14:6), and the Holy Spirit is “*the Spirit of truth*” (John 16:13). The Spirit doesn’t just fill our minds with information. He shapes our character. He leads us to love truth, speak truth, and live truth. A Spirit-filled life is a truthful life. A Spirit-filled church is a community where people can trust each other and where what we say matches how we live. The world desperately needs truthful people—and truthful churches. By walking in God’s truth, we become living signs that the God of truth is real.

Prayer Points

- **“God of truth, help me see You clearly and know You through Jesus.”** Ask the Spirit to reveal God’s truth to your heart—not just as ideas, but as a relationship.
- **“Lord, make me a person of integrity—honest in my words, thoughts, and actions.”** Pray for strength to reject lies, exaggeration, and hypocrisy.
- **“Faithful God, help me trust Your promises even when life feels uncertain.”** Ask for the assurance that God’s truth and faithfulness will carry you through every season.

Thursday (Late Night)

THE PERFECTIONS OF GOD

The God who is enough in every way

The “perfections of God” refer to the qualities God has in infinite measure—His unlimited power, wisdom, and presence.

(A) GOD IS OMNIPOTENT

God is all-powerful, sovereign, and able to accomplish everything He wills. He never grows tired, never loses control, and never faces a situation too difficult for Him. From creation to the resurrection, the Bible presents a God who works powerfully throughout history.

The Bible shows God’s power in many ways:

- **Creation:** God formed the world simply by speaking. “*You made the heavens and the earth by Your great power*” (Jer. 32:17).
- **Sustaining the world:** God is “*sustaining all things by His powerful word*” (Heb. 1:3). Your heartbeat, every sunrise, every moment of life—God sustains it all.
- **Delivering His people:** God’s “*right hand*” rescued Israel from Egypt (Exod. 15:6). No empire was strong enough to stop Him.
- **Saving sinners:** The gospel itself is “*the power of God*” (Rom. 1:16) because only God can change a human heart.
- **Raising Jesus:** God raised Jesus from the dead and enthroned Him far above all powers (Eph. 1:19–20).
- **Completing history:** Revelation calls God “*the Almighty... who is to come*” (Rev. 1:8). His power will one day renew all creation.

From beginning to end, Scripture reveals God as El Shaddai, the Almighty One who completes every promise. The Bible repeats this

truth so we never forget it: “*Is anything too hard for the LORD?*” (Gen. 18:14), “*With God all things are possible*” (Matt. 19:26), etc.

What God’s Power Means for You

God’s omnipotence is not just a doctrine—it affects daily life. You have a place of refuge and need not live in fear (Ps. 91:1). God gives strength to the weak by renewing those who feel tired, overwhelmed, or discouraged (Isa. 40:29–31). He empowers you to overcome sin and live a new life (Eph. 2:5). God’s power works within you to do “*more than all we ask or imagine*” because His Spirit lives in you (Eph. 3:20). Jesus promised “*power from on high*” (Luke 24:49) so the church can heal the sick, preach boldly, deliver the oppressed, and show God’s love to the world.

Prayer Points

- **“God, show Your power in the areas where I feel weak or afraid.”** Ask God to strengthen you when you feel stressed, discouraged, or overwhelmed.
- **“Holy Spirit, fill me with Your power to live like Jesus every day.”** Ask the Spirit to enable you to overcome sin, fear, and insecurity.
- **“Lord, use Your power through me to love and help others.”** Ask for boldness to pray, serve, encourage, and step out in faith.

Friday (Early Morning)

(B) GOD IS OMNISCIENT

God knows our past, present, future, and the deepest parts of our hearts

1. God Knows the Future

God's knowledge includes everything that has happened, everything that is happening, and everything that will happen. David writes that God knows every day of our lives before any of them comes to pass (Ps. 139:4, 16). When we face unexpected news, God has already seen the whole story and is ready to walk with us through it.

2. God Knows Every Heart

God's knowledge is deeply personal. He knows every heart fully. The Bible says He searches our thoughts, motives, and desires (Jer. 17:10). This means God understands why we do what we do, the fears we don't talk about, the quiet dreams buried inside us, the struggles we cannot explain, the sins we hide, and the wounds we carry.

3. God's Knowledge is Both Searching and Comforting

Because God knows everything, His knowledge can feel searching. Nothing is hidden. Psalm 139 captures this tension beautifully: *"You have searched me, LORD, and you know me... How precious to me are your thoughts, God!"* God sees every fear, every failure, every weakness—and still loves us.

4. God's Knowledge Calls Us to Righteous Living

Because God sees everything, His omniscience teaches us to live with sincerity and integrity. David told Solomon, *"The LORD*

understands every plan and every thought” (1 Chron. 28:9). God invites us to walk honestly before Him—not in fear, but in authenticity.

5. God’s Wisdom

God’s wisdom is the beautiful, creative expression of His knowledge. God formed the world *“by wisdom”* (Prov. 3:19; Jer. 10:12). God guides the rise and fall of nations, seasons, and rulers (Dan. 2:20–22). God’s *“hidden”* wisdom planned salvation long before time began (1 Cor. 2:7). Through the church, His *“manifold wisdom”* becomes visible to the world (Eph. 3:10). But the greatest display of divine wisdom is the cross. Only God can turn death into victory, sin into salvation, and weakness into power!

Prayer Points

- **“God, thank You for knowing me completely. Help me trust Your wisdom for my life.”** Pray for the confidence to rest in God’s perfect knowledge.
- **“Jesus, search my heart and help me live honestly before You.”** Ask Him to reveal areas that need healing, cleansing, or surrender.
- **“Holy Spirit, guide me with Your wisdom in all my decisions.”** Pray for clarity, direction, and discernment as you walk through school, relationships, and life.

Friday (Late Night)

(C) GOD IS OMNIPRESENT

God is everywhere, fully present, fully attentive, fully loving

1. God is Present to Every Human Being

Psalm 139 explains this beautifully: If we go up to the heavens or to the depths—God is there. If we run, hide, or feel lost—"Your hand will guide me... Your right hand will hold me fast."

2. The Incarnate Presence: God With Us in Jesus

Jesus is Emmanuel—God with us. Through Jesus' incarnation, we see God's heart, God's love, and God's nearness in a human face.

3. The Holy Spirit Makes God's Presence Immediate and Real

God's omnipresence becomes *experienced* through the Holy Spirit. God is not only everywhere—He is *within* His people. The Spirit dwells in every believer's heart (John 14:17), turning God's nearness into comfort, conviction, joy, worship, and spiritual power.

EPILOGUE: THE GLORY OF GOD'S LOVE

In Pentecostal theology, God's glory is not just dazzling light or overwhelming power. God's glory is the radiant outpouring of His holy love. Glory is what God's love looks like when it shines.

1. God's Glory is the Radiance of Holy Love: Ezekiel's rainbow throne, Isaiah's heavenly vision, and John's Revelation throne room show the shining beauty of divine love.

2. **God’s Actions Reveal Glory Because They Reveal Love:** Every mighty act—creation, deliverance, miracles, judgement—reveals God’s love in motion. When God freed Israel from Egypt, it was not only power; it was love breaking oppression.
3. **Glory and Worship: Love at the Centre:** When angels cry “*Glory to God in the highest*” (Luke 2:14), they are celebrating God coming near in humility and mercy. Worship is joy in God’s love.
4. **The Earth Filled with Glory = The Earth Filled with Love:** “*The glory of the Lord fills the whole earth*” (Num. 14:21)—The world becomes full of God’s glory when it becomes full of God’s healing and love.
5. **Our Fulfilment in Glory = Sharing in God’s Love:** We see God’s glory “*in the face of Jesus Christ*” (2 Cor. 4:6). Our future hope—“*They shall see His face*” (Rev. 22:4)—means entering forever into God’s overflowing love.


Prayer Points

- **“God, help me become more aware of Your presence.”** Pray that your heart will stay sensitive to God’s nearness. Ask the Spirit to make God’s presence real every day.
- **“Jesus, let Your glorious love shine in me.”** Ask Jesus to fill you with the same love that shines from His cross and resurrection. Pray that others can see God’s glory through your life.
- **“Holy Spirit, dwell in me and use me to bring God’s love into the world.”** Invite the Spirit to make you a carrier of God’s presence. Pray for boldness to love others, courage to stand for what is right, and compassion to serve those who are hurting.
